To address the issue of education of the locals, the school was started by the Adarsh Vikas Mandal founder Chairman Late Shri. B.B. More, who was the veteran social worker. He started Marathi Medium Primary & Secondary schools. In 1999 Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil Junior College was established.

Adarsh Vikas Mandal, Karmaveer Bhaurao Patil College of Arts & Commerce was established in the year 2009. The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai. In 2009 the first affiliation was granted for the Bachelor of Arts & Bachelor of Commerce. In 2014, new permissions were received for 2 self-finance programs, Bachelor of Commerce – Accounting and Finance, Bachelor of Science- Information Technology. In 2016 further, the college received permission for a B. Com – Banking & Insurance and an additional division of Bachelor of Commerce – Accounting & Finance. Currently, the college runs 5 programs of the University of Mumbai. In 2009 the college started with a mere 45 students and now over 800 students are enrolled in the college.

## **1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY**

#### **Curricular Aspects**

The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai and follows the curriculum prescribed by the University. The college follows a systematic approach to curriculum planning and delivery. It prepares an Academic Calendar based on the University Circular, which includes all academic, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities. Regular staff meetings and orientations ensure smooth functioning. The timetable committee prepares the schedule, while IQAC provides teaching plans, syllabus completion reports, and daily lecture reports.

Teachers use a combination of traditional and innovative methodologies to ensure effective curriculum delivery. They use student-centric methods, including Orientation Programmes, Bridge Courses and provide study materials. They use Chalk and Board, ICT-enabled teaching-learning methods, group discussions, case studies, seminars, industry expert guidance, research papers, and internships. The college also organizes study tours, industrial visits, and project work for degree fulfillment.

The college conducts continuous internal evaluation, including internal and semester examinations, class tests, assignments, and project work. Teachers guide students and remedial coaching is provided for slow learners and failed students. Feedback is taken to improve curriculum delivery and case studies are discussed. Seminars, industry expert sessions, research papers, and internships are organized for degree fulfillment.

The college strongly believes in imparting all-round knowledge to students, which grooms the students to

become responsible citizens.

The college integrates cross-cutting issues such as Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability in the curriculum.

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The college employs various teaching-learning strategies, focusing on student-centred learning. The main methodologies include experiential learning, participatory learning, and problem-solving. Students are encouraged to think creatively and participate in various competitions, such as the Avishkar Research Competition, and research paper and poster presentation competitions. The college also encourages internships, field visits, and hands-on training sessions. Participative learning includes seminars, webinars, group discussions, debates, and quizzes, as well as community projects and social welfare-based activities. Case studies are used to apply theoretical knowledge to practical situations. ICT is used extensively, with online tools like PPTs, YouTube videos, and Google Classrooms used for sharing notes and submission of assignments.

The Institute's approach to teaching goes beyond the traditional chalk-and-board method, incorporating guest lectures, open classrooms, short-term training programs, workshops, and training sessions led by experts in their fields.

The college ensures transparency in internal and external assessments through the examination committee. This committee displays the examination scheme and evaluation pattern, conducts orientation sessions, and prepares exam timetables in line with Academic Calendar guidelines. They also provide separate seating arrangements for physically disabled students and moderate answer books according to university guidelines.

The college conducts university-level exams for Semesters V & VI, adhering to university guidelines. The grievance redressal system is efficient and fair, with teachers instructed for unbiased assessment. Students with queries or doubts can apply for revaluation or photocopy, and the Unfair Means Committee handles malpractices during exams.

The college encourages internships through collaboration with local industries, field visits and training sessions. Seminars and webinars are organized to enhance student's skills and knowledge for academic development. The college also conducts research paper and poster presentation competitions.

The college evaluates PO and CO attainment through various methods, including internal assessments, class tests, assignments, and project work. Feedback on the syllabus is sought from various stakeholders, including students, alumni, parents, and employers. Reports of events and programs conducted for students, such as placement reports, seminars, workshops, and study tours/industrial visits, also help in analyzing and interpreting program and course outcomes.

#### Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The college aims holistic development of students. The college follows the curriculum prescribed by the University of Mumbai. The programs offered by the college have interdisciplinary courses/ topics. These courses covered human values and social issues, ethics, value education, etc. To attain a multi- disciplinary approach, the college also offers skill development courses and collaboration with industry for internships and placements.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	NEP 2020 facilitates multiple entry and exits in pursuing higher education. This enables students to choose their learning path to attend a degree/diploma/certificate. Working on the principle

1	of multiple entry and exit will facilitate anytime,
	anywhere, and at any level of learning. The ABC will offer us an online centralized system of credit accumulation and enable student mobility. This is a boon to our urban students as they exit somewhere, engage in gainful employment for some time to support their family or their education in the future, and come back and pursue their studies. This will reduce the dropout ratio in the higher education system. The institute is fully prepared to implement the ABC once the NEP 2020 which is implemented by the Government of Maharashtra and the University of Mumbai. The college has been instrumental in helping the students get their ABC ID since the Academic Year 2022-22. The awareness program was conducted at the time of admission for the students and parents. The college is preparing with various skill development courses, more tie-ups to bridge the gap between industry-academia linkages.
3. Skill development:	The college offers a variety of skill development courses aimed at enhancing students' employability and practical expertise. These include courses in Communication Skills, Basics in Computer Literacy, Computerized Accounting, Event Management, Leadership Skills and Communication, Web Development, etc. Each course is designed with industry input, ensuring relevance and practical application. Expert instructors and hands-on training provide students with the tools they need to succeed in their careers. Collaborative MOUs are also been signed for conducting these courses.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college has taken a progressive step by integrating the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) into its teaching methodology. This initiative aims to blend traditional wisdom with modern education, providing students with a holistic learning experience. Many of the courses incorporate principles from ancient Indian texts on economics, management, and ethics. Regular workshops and seminars on IKS topics are conducted, featuring experts in fields like Indian philosophy, yoga, and traditional arts. These sessions provide students with in-depth knowledge and practical applications of IKS. Cultural activities such as yoga sessions, classical music, and dance performances are integrated into the college calendar, enriching

The college follows the systematic process of effective curriculum planning and delivery.

#### 1. Curriculum Planning:

- The College prepares an Academic Calendar based on the University Circular and displays it on the College Website.
- Curricular, co-curricular activities and extra-curricular activities are planned in the academic calendar.
- It helps for the smooth functioning of all the activities conducted throughout the year.
- Staff meetings are conducted by the Principal regularly to plan and control the curriculum delivery process.
- Orientation of the teaching staff is conducted at the beginning of the academic year to communicate the course/ subject allocation depending upon the qualifications and competencies of the teachers.
- The timetable committee prepares the timetable after considering the inputs from departmental heads.
- IQAC provides a format of teaching plan, syllabus completion report, and daily lecture report. Teachers prepare the lesson plan as per the guidelines of the University. Teachers furnish all the details and timely submit them to the departmental heads.

#### 2. Curriculum Planning:

The college ensures effective curriculum delivery by adapting various traditional as well as innovative methodologies

Teachers use Student-centric Methods to add value to teaching and learning. The Orientation Programme is organized for new entrants. Bridge Courses at the entry level are conducted. Teachers also provide study material to students.

The college strongly believes in imparting all-around knowledge to students, which grooms the students to become responsible citizens.

The college integrates cross-cutting issues such as Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability in the curriculum.

These issues have been addressed in the various courses, seminars, and outreach activities conducted by the college.

#### **Professional Ethics:**

Courses like Environmental Studies, Foundation Course, Communication Skills, Business Communication, Business Ethics, Organizational Behaviour, Business Environment, Ethos

in Indian Management, Principles of Management, Principles, and Practices of Banking & Insurance, Cyber Law, Ethics, and Corporate Social Responsibility are part of the curriculum and emphasize the importance of human values and professional ethics.

Various activities are conducted regularly beyond the classrooms/ curriculum. The seminars and guest sessions by industry experts were conducted like Cyber Security and Ethical hacking by Thane Police Commissionerate, community service projects, and sessions where students are encouraged to analyse the situation where their professional ethics are being tested.

#### **Gender Sensitization:**

Gender equality means treating all genders with fairness and equity without any discrimination. Courses like the Foundation Course (F.Y. & S.Y. for all programs), which is a compulsory course for all programs expose students to the importance of treating all genders fairly.

- Sessions addressing child abuse and awareness of the POCSO Act were also held with the help of government bodies.
- A special initiative has been taken for the last 4 years where the college celebrates Navaratri by organizing the "Navdurga" program. During this program leading and successful women are felicitated by giving the award.

**Environment and Sustainability:** Many courses focus on the environmental and sustainability aspect as it is one of the most challenging issues facing mankind. #### 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

#### **Response:**

The college, along with traditional lecture methods, uses various student-centric techniques for an effective teaching-learning experience and improved learning outcomes for students.

#### A. Experiential learning:

- 1. **Research Projects:** Project work is mandatory for all the courses offered at the UG and PG Programs. The students from across departments are made to complete research-based projects on topics related to their syllabi and other areas, such as University research projects such as Avishkar. Such projects are prepared on practical problems and help to develop their research aptitude.
- 2. **Internships**: Students of Self-Financing programs are encouraged for Internships. Students learn practical industry-related skills with these internships, which leads to the enhancement of their professional skills. Students from self-financing programs undertake summer internships during their course at various government & private organizations.
- 3. **Practical Problems:** Various practical problems and case studies are given to students to solve in some of the courses like Taxation, Business Law, Accountancy, etc.

#### **B.** Participative Learning Methodologies:

1. **Group Discussions:** To improve communication skills and public speaking among students in courses like Business Communication, and Foundation Course, students are assigned various current event-based topics.

Students are made to participate in group discussions individually as well as in teams where they express their views and opinions on various topics

- 2. **Debate:** Debates are organised in various courses to improve public speaking and confidence among students.
- 3. Newspaper reading & Book reviews: To Enhance critical thinking among Students and create interest in learning various courses like management, finance, etc students are assigned tasks of reading news articles based on various issues from newspapers, magazines, etc.
- 4. **Community project:** Students of the college participate in community projects and several other social welfare-based activities and learn through experience such as conducting surveys in villages and visiting farmlands etc.

#### C. Problem-solving:

- 1. **Case studies**: The case study method is adopted in the teaching-learning process to create awareness among students in logical thinking and also to develop practical knowledge in problem-solving ability. This method is used in programs like business law, accountancy management, etc.
- 2. Assignments, Quizzes, and Presentations: Assignments, quizzes, and presentations are conducted to develop logical reasoning and problem-solving skills among students in all UG and PG programmers. Various Departments organise case study analysis/problem-solving questions to be answered by the students. Students are taught to solve a problem/case study in most of the courses in the UG and PG programs. Thus, the students learn to solve many practical cases after the courses. Active learning is another form of learning in which teaching strives to involve students in the learning process more directly than other methods.

#### **D.** Use of ICT in Teaching and Learning Process:

• Teachers make extensive use of various online tools such as PPTs, and YouTube videos, to make the teaching-learning process interesting. Teachers also use Google Classrooms for sharing notes and submission of assignments. To provide the best to its students, the College strives to keep pace with ever-evolving technology.

**Response:** 

The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai. The college adheres to the Rules & Regulations and Guidelines given by the University of Mumbai.

#### Mechanism for Ensuring Transparency in Internal/ External Assessment:

Examination Committees, consisting of the senior teacher as Convener and the Principal as the Chief Conductor, have been constituted for all examinations. The committee planned and performed the following functions to ensure transparency in all exams.

- The examination scheme and evaluation pattern are displayed in the college prospectus and on the college website.
- Orientation sessions are conducted at the beginning of the academic year for students to explain the examination pattern.
- Examination committee prepares the exam timetable for internal as well as semester examinations in line with Academic Callender.
- Time-tables and seating arrangements for various examinations are communicated to students and teachers well in advance through notices during lectures, notice boards, the college website, and WhatsApp app groups.
- Teachers are asked to submit 3 sets of question papers of which one is randomly selected by the examination committee.
- For internal examination, the syllabus is informed to students by the concerned subject teacher, and the semester-end examination is conducted on the syllabus.
- Separate seating arrangements on the ground floor are made for disabled students and the College also provides writing, reader, and extra time to such students as per university guidelines.
- The answer books assessed by the examiners are moderated as per the University Guidelines. All course answer sheets across all programs are moderated by the external.

#### Additional Measures Taken for the University-Level Examination:

The College also conducts University Level exams for Semesters V & VI. During these exams, the college adheres to guidelines given by the university.

- Online Transmission of Question Paper: Question Papers are transmitted online just one hour before the examination for printing. The papers are downloaded by the IT coordinator under the supervision of the Principal and Exam Convener.
- Online Screen-based Marking (OSM) System: The college follows the guidelines of the University in the on-screen marking system. Answer books are centrally assessed in the College premises under the Central Assessment Programm. (CAP)

#### The grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient.

All grievances related to the Internal and External Examination are dealt with in a fair, transparent, and timebound manner. The Examination Committee addresses grievances arising during the examinations.

- The examination committee takes utmost precaution to mitigate grievances.
- Teachers are instructed strictly for unbiased assessment.
- The student having the query or doubt about the assessment is entertained by the exam committee.
- Such students can apply for Re-evaluation or photocopy or both by paying the requisite fee. If the deviation is found then, the student is awarded with the revalued marks. In this case, the fee paid by the student is refunded.

#### **Response:**

The College believes in the Outcome-Based Education process. We practice student-centric teaching and learning methodology in the delivery of courses, continuous assessments are planned to achieve the stated objectives and outcomes of the courses. POs and PSOs are available on the Institute website https://kbpcollegethane.net/

POs and PSOs are communicated to employers and Alumni by sending mail, and messages and are displayed during the Alumni Meeting.

The COs and their mapping with POs and PSOs are elaborately discussed and derived by the departments. COs are communicated to the students during the introduction class itself. COs along with pedagogical plans are printed and issued to the students during the orientation lecture on the first day as well as the pdf of the same is uploaded in the course-wise Google classrooms. During the discussion of the course, the outcomes of the course are also focused. During the commencement of each unit and after the completion of the unit, the course outcomes are reviewed and measured. We focus on measuring student performance i.e. outcomes at different levels of assessment using direct and indirect methods of evaluation.

#### Following is the process used by the college for POs and COs attainment mapping:

1. For every subject 6 course outcomes (CO) are defined and mapped to Program outcomes (PO) on a scale of 0 to 3. The highest correlation is 3.

2. Maximum marks allotted to each question is mapped to a cognitive level and the corresponding CO. The percentage is recorded of students achieving a set percentage of maximum marks allotted to an individual CO in a given continuous assessment.

3. Indirect attainment is determined from student exit surveys, employer surveys, co-curricular activities, and extracurricular activities and mapped to POs. If the target is achieved then the next level is set to be achieved, if not then corrective measures are taken to achieve the targeted level of attainment.

Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes as described in NEP are taken into consideration sincerely while teaching any topic of course. The college invites industry experts to deliver guest lectures, seminars, and workshops for students. Students are also taken on industrial visits where they learn by observing which includes locations namely Samarth Bharat plant for waste management, Vyas Creation, Vidhan Bhavan, Stock exchange, and many more. Alumni students who are now thriving in various career fields visit the college frequently and contribute by organizing educational & extracurricular events for current students. The college strongly encourages students to network with industry professionals at these events.

#### **Response:**

#### **Governance Leadership and Management**

- The college is governed by its parent body Adarsh Vikas Mandal.
- Important policy decisions are taken by Adarsh Vikas Mandal in consultation with the College Development Committee. Frequent meetings of Managing committee of Adarsh Vikas Mandal are conducted to discuss and decide upon important matters.
- The Institute has a set of well-defined policies of Governance that have been framed in close consultation with the stakeholders. These policies are communicated to faculty members and students at regular intervals.

#### **College Development Committee: (CDC)**

• The College Development Committee is constituted according to the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016. Along with trustee members, experts from industry, education, research & social service are part of the CDC. Proper representation of Teaching & non-teaching staff, students, and alumni is considered and valued. Important decisions regarding Academic, Administration, Financial, and student support are discussed and decided in the meetings. Three to four meetings of CDC are scheduled in a year.

#### Administrative Set-up & Decentralization of Power:

- The administrative setup of the institution has been so designed to facilitate quick decisions and prompt action.
- The authority of day-to-day management of the college is vested with the Principal.
- To make things simple and efficient administrative rights and authorities are also delegated to the IQAC, Program, and committee coordinators. Different statutory and functional committees are constituted to look after curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular, and extension activities.
- The responsibilities of these committees are given to the teachers. Sometimes the authority has been percolated down to students' level in matters about them. Proper representation of students is also considered in various committees and student councils.
- Regular departmental and staff meetings are conducted to review the functioning of the college and the execution of the decisions.

#### **Appointment and Service Rules**

• The appointment of teaching and non-teaching is planned in April for the next academic year. After assessing the workload and performance appraisal of existing staff, the report is put before the management. After getting approval from management, an advertisement is placed in the newspaper inviting applications. After following the systematic interview process, eligible new candidates are appointed, and existing eligible candidates are re-appointed. The procedure of appointment and service rules and guidelines given by UGC or the University is observed.

#### The Perspective Plan & Strategic Plans:

- The college makes use of strategic plans (annual) and perspective plans for long term.
- Strategic Plans are deployed for each functional area on an annual basis. A Perspective Plan is a long-term plan prepared by the Management in consultation with the Principal, CDC, and IQAC.
- IQAC plays a vital role in aligning short-term plans with the long-term goals. With the help of IQAC both the plans are deployed effectively. The existing perspective plan is approved and implemented by CDC & IQAC from 2019-20 to 2023-24. The major objective of this is about the NAAC accreditation, infrastructure expansion, and quality enhancement initiatives.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

#### **Response:**

The KBP college is governed by Adarsh Vikas Mandal and bounded by the rules and regulations of the trust while mobilizing and utilizing the funds.

#### Mobilization of funds:

- The college has permission on a permanently unaided basis. Being an unaided college, the main source of income is fees received from students.
- Student fees collected are as per the Guidelines of the University of Mumbai.
- Along with the fees from students, other income sources are:
- Grants for funding various programs of the National Service Scheme (NSS) & Book Bank Schemes by the Student Welfare Department of the University of Mumbai.
- State Government Scholarships and Freeships (disbursed to the concerned students' Bank A/c directly)
- Sale of forms, Certificate fees, Exam Fees, etc.

#### **Optimum Utilisation of Financial Resources:**

- Every year annual budget is prepared well in advance as per the needs and requirements of the various departments. It is approved by the College Development Committee.
- Major expenses related to the expansion of infrastructure or purchasing of assets are approved

first by the Governing Council and CDC.

- The funds are utilized for all recurring and non-recurring expenditures.
- The college requires funds for salary, infrastructural development, routine academic and nonacademic activities, sports, and cultural programs, and competitions, for providing scholarships and other kinds of financial assistance.

#### Accounts and Audit:

- The college has a well-defined mechanism to monitor the effective utilization of available financial resources.
- All funds mobilized are properly accounted for in the books of account.
- Separate accounts are opened in the bank for Salary and non-salary expenses. A separate account is maintained for the scholarship/ freeship grants received from the government.
- A systematic auditing process is observed by the parent body, Adarsh Vikas Mandal. Internal as well as external audit is conducted. Qualified auditors are appointed for the purpose.
- The process of vouching is followed by an actual audit of transactions entered in various books of
- accounts like cash books, bank passbooks, and other subsidiary records.
- Specific emphasis is given to accounting records of statutory compliances and payments such as TDS, GST, and EPF.
- Inter-institutional transactions are also checked.
- In case, the auditor has any query/objection about a specific entry or document, the same is raised and communicated to the accounts head.
- If the Internal auditor still feels that some of the issues are still to be discussed with the management, he will bring such issues to the notice of the management. Statutory auditor/s are appointed in the AGM of the parent body, Adarsh Vikas Mandal.

#### **Response:**

To foster a more inclusive and equitable environment, our college has initiated the comprehensive Gender Sensitization program. This initiative aims to educate and empower the college community about gender issues, promote gender equality, and create a safe and supportive environment for all students, faculty, and staff.

#### The following are the key components of our gender sensitization initiatives:

#### 1. The Women Development Cell (WDC) & Internal Committee (IC)

WDC & IC conducts various programs, to educate and prevent sexual harassment in the workplace. Selfdefense workshops and various counseling and women empowerment sessions are conducted for female students. An internal Complaint committee was also formed to look into sexual harassment complaints.

#### 2. Promoting Representation:

The college actively works to increase the representation of underrepresented genders in faculty positions, and leadership roles. Women are represented at every level in management, academia, and student body at a significantly greater percentage. There are women in the positions of Managing Trustee, IQAC Coordinator, Exam Convener, NSS Program Officer, Head of the Cultural Committee, NSS Secretary, and Student Council Secretary.

#### **3. Inclusive Environment:**

The college is dedicated to the cause of education of socially and economically underprivileged students, especially girls. The college is situated in the outer part of the city in the Wagle Industrial Area. The larger strata of this area are of low-income groups. Many times, female students here find it difficult to

pursue higher education. The college gives admission to female students and even to boys who are socially and economically backward. In this case college offers them, an installment facility and also supports such students for getting government and other scholarships.

#### 4. Safe & Secured Environment

The College implements measures to ensure campus safety, such as better lighting, security services, CCTV, etc. The entire college has installed 30+ CCTV for surveillance. E- Surveillance with high-resolution cameras through day and night facilities, this system ensures that all Female staff and students can move freely in the campus and feel assured that they are secure at all times in the campus.

#### 5. Gender sensitisation in the curricular and co-curricular activities:

The programs B. Com, BBI, BAF, and BA have the course of Foundation Course, which covers the topics like gender sensitization, human values, etc. Various projects, assignments, and group discussions were also conducted to sensitize students towards the subject.

By initiating a **Gender Audit** and adopting these measures, a college demonstrates its commitment to fostering an environment where all individuals, regardless of gender, can thrive and achieve their full potential.
